CONTENT	Component 2 – Externally Set Assignment:					
Dankanativa	The question paper will consist of a choice of eight questions to be used as starting points. Students are required to select one. They will be provided with the paper on 1 February, or as soon as possible after that date.					
Declarative	Students are required to work in one or more of the endorsed titles as those listed below.					
Knowledge – 'Know What'	• Fine art: for example, drawing, painting, mixed-media, sculpture, ceramics, installation, printmaking, moving image (video, film, animation) and photography.					
	 Three-dimensional design: for example, ceramics, sculpture, exhibition design, design for theatre, television and film, interior design, product design Photography: for example, portraiture, landscape photography, still life photography, documentary photography, photojournalism, fashion photography, experimental imagery, multimedia, photographic installation and moving image (video, film, animation). 					
	Preparatory work can be presented in any suitable format, such as mounted sheets, design sheets, sketchbooks, workbooks, journals, models and maquettes. Following the preparatory period, students must complete 15 hours of unaided, supervised time. The first 3 hours of the supervised time must be consecutive. In the 15 hours students must produce a finished outcome or a series of related finished outcomes, informed by their preparatory work. Students must stop work on their preparatory work as soon as the first period of supervised time starts.					
	Students may refer to their preparatory work in the supervised time, but it must not be added to or amended.					
	The work produced during the supervised time must be clearly identified as such. Students must identify and acknowledge sources which are not their own. Annotation and/or notes should use appropriate specialist vocabulary and be legible with accurate use of language so that meaning is clear.					
	There is no restriction on the scale of work produced. Students should carefully select, organise and present work to ensure that they provide evidence which meets the requirements of all four assessment					
	objectives.					
Skills	Students will be expected to demonstrate skills in the context of their chosen area(s) of fine art. In addition, students will be required to demonstrate skills all the following:					
Procedural	1. Appreciation of different approaches to recording images, such as observation, analysis, expression and imagination					
Knowledge –	2. Awareness of intended audience or purpose for their chosen area(s) of fine art					
'Know How'	3. Understanding of the conventions of figurative/representational and abstract/non-representational imagery or genres					
	4. Appreciation of different ways of working, such as, using underpainting, glazing, wash and impasto.					

	5. Modelling, carving, casting, constructing, assembling and welding; etching, engraving, dry point, mono printing and lino printing.									
	6. To understanding of pictorial space, composition, rhythm, scale and structure									
	7. Appreciation of colour, line, tone, texture, shape and form.

They must identify and acknowledge sources which are not their own and provide evidence of drawing activity and written annotation.
