




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#### Geography

Anti-Bullying Week 14th - 18th November



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Anti-Bullying Week is co-ordinated in England and Wales by the Anti-Bullying Alliance and this year's theme was Reach Out. The theme of Reach Out came about following consultation with teachers and pupils by the Anti-Bullying Alliance. Teachers and children wanted a theme that empowered them to do something positive to counter the harm and hurt that bullying causes.

Anti-Bullying Week reminds everyone whether it's in school, at home, in the community or online, to reach out and show each other the support we need.

The St Mary's Anti-Bullying Ambassadors, who have all received training from The Diana Award and wear bright blue lanyards so they are easily identified, presented the Act of Worship to all years. They reached out to all who have been bullied and also to all who were and are still practicing bullying, with the aim to embrace forgiveness. Forgiveness can lead to feelings of understanding, empathy and compassion. Forgiveness brings a kind of peace that helps you go on with life.

Activities took place throughout the week during form time, from simple discussions about how we can 'reach out' and offer support, to identifying the roles involved in bullying within various fictional scenarios.

Just Talk Week 21st – 25th November



Just Talk is a multi-agency campaign, steered by young people. Just Talk Week's theme for 2022 is to 'Look beneath the surface', to be patient with others, as we can't always know the challenges that someone may be facing. It's important to understand that if you see a friend, family member or someone else you know acting unusually or not their typical self, they may be having a bad day or going through a difficult time. That's why, more than ever, it's so important we don't jump to conclusions about people or judge them unkindly.

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In St Mary's, activities took place during form time, discussing and encouraging students to support each other in various ways and signposting students to support offered locally. Keeping emotions like sadness, fear or frustration locked up inside can sometimes cause them to come out in other ways, like outbursts of anger, being grumpy, or isolating yourself from people you care about. This Just Talk Week, explores the different ways to help - it's often as simple as just talking and listening. "Talking shows strength, not weakness".
