Dear Parents/Carers

As we come to the end of the Autumn Term, and my first term here, I would like to thank you for your support since September. For those of you who contributed to the Parent/Carer survey, I thank you - I am waiting for Kirkland Rowell to provide the analysis and will report back on this in the new year.

I would like to wish you and your family a very happy and Holy Christmas. I like to remind students that this can be an incredibly busy time for parents/carers and that they should offer to 'lend a hand' at home during the busy times. Please feel free to get them involved in the preparation and work for Christmas; I take the view that if someone is old enough to own an expensive smart phone then they are old enough to do some household chores!

On 4th December, five students from KS3 represented St Mary's in the annual Mayoral Debate at the Council Chambers. Seven local schools took part. This year they were tasked with creating and presenting a group speech which argued that Broxbourne's green spaces must be maintained for relaxation, exercise and farming whilst the counter argument that some schools had to debate was that to secure a prosperous future, it is necessary to develop Broxbourne's green spaces for housing, retail and leisure - a very current and challenging topic I am sure you would agree. For some of the students it was their first time in public speaking, for others, it came after their recent public speaking LAMDA exams. All students spoke eloquently, with passion and clarity. Their arguments were well developed and all their lunch time and after school rehearsals paid off. The standard of entry gets better each year and the students can be very proud of their second place award. There will be a club set up where students can further develop their skills and interests in debating - watch this space. The students were: Starr (Y9) Rex, Louise, and Adam (Y8) and Daniel (Y7). We are also pleased that a number of parents/carers also lent their support.

We run Public Speaking exams twice yearly, in November and May. The group meets at lunchtime on a Wednesday and this is a great opportunity for students to develop skills in public speaking and in being able to talk about topics that interest and excite them. Recently, one student created two speeches, each lasting four minutes without reading from a script. One speech was on Jamaica, where her grandmother had come from there, her other speech was on overfishing of our seas and the environmental impact of this. Another student spoke about conspiracy theories. The next exam is in May and if your child is interested in getting involved then please ask them to see Mrs Crawford or Ms King for further details.

On Friday 29th November, 65 Year 11 students attended Poetry Live at the Apollo Victoria Theatre in London. All students were given a magazine upon arrival, which included background information on the poets, copies of the poems and exemplar responses from the Chief Examiner. Students were able to discover more about the inspiration and interpretation of their set poems and were particularly keen to hear from Imtiaz Dharker whose poem Tissue is the most contentious in the anthology. The most popular poet – John Agard – ended the day with an animated reading of his poems to roaring applause. In the examiner sessions, the Chief Examiner dealt with two skills vital for success in the GCSE English Literature examinations, giving advice and guidance on how to approach the challenging 'unseen' section of the exam. He explained how to think and write about the poems for the best possible results and to look at comparing poems most effectively – both really useful skills! This was a fantastic trip supporting students as they prepare for their examinations - the students who attended were a credit to the school.

Two weeks ago the A Level Drama students took a trip to the National Theatre to see a modern adaptation of Chekhov's Three Sisters. Set against the back drop of the creation of Biafra in the 1960s, the play engaged the audience in the tragic and sad story of Lolo, Nne Chukwo and Udo who long to escape their lives and return to Lagos. It was a great adaptation and both students and staff had a good evening. Chekhov is one of the great theatrical writers and it was so great to see a modern production engaging the audience.

The Modern Foreign Languages department have been impressed by the hard work and motivation demonstrated by the vast majority of our 26 French and 43 Spanish Year 11 students in their recent GCSE speaking mock exams, which took place 2nd – 6th December. Students were required to act out a role play situation, describe a visual stimulus and answer more general questions on a variety of topics. Many of our students sat the exam with great confidence, arising from their thorough preparation and revision, and we are proud of their efforts. A reminder for the final exam in May to revise in good time, using the role play, photo card and general conversation revision materials.

We take people's mental health seriously at St Mary's and last week the 6th form Student Leadership delivered a Time to Talk workshop during break and lunch. We had a number of students attend from Year 10 and Year 9 and the idea of the workshop was to get students talking about their mental health. We are hoping to hold similar workshops after the new year run by 6th form students and the aim is to encourage our students to talk to their peers about mental health and the importance of looking after it.
