In a world where it is common for people to change careers 5 times during their lifetime getting the skills to navigate the job application process is invaluable.


Christmas Hampers

Drama - Mayor's Debate 2022

On 23rd November a group of six of our year 8's participated in the annual Mayoral Debate competition at Broxbourne Council Chambers. This is an annual event that was last held in 2019 and due to the pandemic has now restarted. Each year the local secondary schools in Broxbourne are given a title to discuss and create a speech around. This year's title was: How can the Borough of Broxbourne build upon the legacy of Her Majesty for the benefit of Broxbourne residents?

A challenging question indeed and a poignant one due to her Majesty's passing in September. Students explored how they could help to create greener spaces around Broxbourne that would attract bees and to create more beehives in Broxbourne and they asked the council to set up a Queen Elizabeth Broxbourne Trust that would get more young people into volunteering in their local communities and be awarded for this.

Students had to present their speech as a team and stand up in front of the other schools and the Mayor. Projecting voices and vocal expression was key to communicating their message, which the students did extremely well. Students worked hard on rehearsing their speech and they did a great job. We are very proud of their achievements.

Maths

During the school closure period this week we tasked out students to use their mathematical skills in a "cool" way.

The task: Estimate the volume of snow in an outdoor space

How: Choose an outdoor space such as front/back/communal garden. Use whatever measuring equipment you have available. Break your space up into shapes you can find the area (and hence volume) of. (rectangles, triangles, trapeziums, circles)


Think about what measurements you are making and what to use for the depth of the snow.

What to submit: Take photos of written work and your space you have chosen outside, draw diagrams with measurements.

Extension: Can you calculate the mass and radius of a snowball made using all the snow in your chosen space? To find the mass you will need the density of "compressed snow" - you could try google searching this information, or it will be more fun if you can find this out for yourself using weighing scales.

While we didn't get the entire garden for Jason (Year 7) We did get a calculation for a sample –






Kairu (Year 11) went for a similar technique and found a volume of a sample of his garden and "scale up" his sample.

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While his sample wasn't quite in the same proportion as his garden, there was some excellent maths used.

The Year 9 boys football team lost 6-4 to Leventhorpe school this evening (28 November). The team struggled to adapt to a very difficult playing surface early on and started the game slowly. Despite having a handful of chances throughout the first half, St Mary's found themselves going in to the break 5-0 down.

The boys were told at half time to play a very 'old school' style of football in order to combat the worsening pitch. The team obliged and begun to find success scoring 4 goals in quick succession. With the score at 5-4, it looked as if St Mary's could be on for a huge comeback. A lot of character and resilience shown to come back from a 5-0 deficit, but certainly some areas of improvement before their next fixture.
